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Executive Committee Report

Greetings from an unseasonably green Hawkes Bay. After what was a very dry six months Mother Nature has decided to bless us with some precipitation: over 150 mm in January. We finished the calendar year about 350 mm short, the worst rainfall number since the horrendous 1998 drought. The grass, crops and lucerne have taken off, which is great timing for lactating hinds and fawns, and the normal February feeding out is on hold for the moment.

I have just returned from a successful "Deer 2 Succeed" field day run in conjunction with Invermay (Bioeconomy Science Institute – AgResearch Group!). The afternoon started with a barbecue lunch with the venison patties kindly supplied and cooked by the team at Duncan NZ. We then had an update on feeding nutrition for velvet stags and velvet haemostasis by Dr David Stevens and Bryan Thompson before heading out on a farm tour of Invermay and further discussing the projects they are currently running. The knowledge held by those working at Invermay is a massive resource and it would be good if we could find more ways of enabling farmers to interact with them and the science they are doing.

In this month's Stagline we have the annual advertisement for industry positions. It is my turn to retire by rotation and after six years I will not be seeking re-election. I would like to take this opportunity to promote the role and encourage DFA members to put their names

forward. We are a small industry and the NZDFA has an important job in ensuring the producers' perspective is understood and considered.

However, apart from being an advocate for farmers, being on the NZDFA Executive Committee has enabled me to learn a lot more about our industry and connect with many different primary industry people. Our network around New Zealand is full of great people and interesting stories that this role enables you to experience first-hand. If you are interested in any future governance roles the NZDFA Executive provides a great introduction and you get to work with a great team, so don't be shy and take this opportunity to get involved.

As usual, the NZDFA Executive Committee has been busy in the background ensuring farmers have representation on the Velvet Grading Guidelines panel as well as continuing to support DINZ in the endeavour to create a Velvet Export Licensing system. Planning for this year's Next Generation programme is well underway; it's going to be in the Bay of Plenty/ Waikato region. The registration opening date and event date are in this Stagline and the itinerary will follow.

The next thing for us on farm is weaning and setting hinds up for mating, we have pastures to resow after summer crops and so the year rolls around. And as many are now considering their parasite management in

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their weaners, DINZ, Wormwise and Beef & Lamb have produced an excellent parasite management calendar which is designed to be an educational tool and now includes specific information for deer. I hope that weaning and the autumn goes well for you and your deer.

Deer2Succeed – Otago style, Monday 9 February 2026

Another Deer2Succeed DFA field day was held at the beginning of this week in glorious Otago sunshine at the AgResearch Invermay Research Centre (now known as the Bioeconomy Science Institute, or BSI).

About 30 people attended including a class of senior agriculture students from Taieri College. The day started off with a BBQ lunch kindly sponsored by Duncan Venison. This was followed by a classroom session

covering feeding nutrition for velvet stags and updates on the research on haemostasis.

The group then jumped into 4WDs and headed into the research farm for an introduction to the deer herd and Tomorrow's Deer breeding hind herd – the industry-funded research programme that underpins advances in deer genetic improvement. This was followed by a stop at a research site examining water quality impacts from four different catchment treatments (fully-fenced waterways, partially fenced, temporary-fenced and no fencing). This led on to findings from the long-term hill and high-country water quality project (water quality on ten deer farms monitored for five years).

Both generated lots of discussion but the bottom line was that each farm has its own environmental conditions and stocking regimes so environmental management has to be tailored to those circumstances. There is no single solution or silver bullet.

The group then visited the Disease Research Limited lab and deer CT scanner and heard updates on parasitology diagnostics and Johne's disease.

Our thanks to all the staff at BSI AgResearch Group and Duncan Venison. In particular Bryan Thompson for putting together the day and Sam Earle for his BBQ prowess (and the burgers!).

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Next Generation 2026

The NZDFA Next Generation Programme is in its 14th year of running and this year it's the North Island's turn to host our young farmers and industry professionals. Bay of Plenty and Waikato DFA branches will be jointly hosting the two-day programme that combines farm visits with exposure to the deer industry beyond the farm gate.

This year attendance will require a registration fee of \$75 (inc GST). This helps cover costs for running the programme (alongside sponsorship). Velvet Grading Guidelines panel – DFA reps

With the current velveting season coming to an end, DINZ will be facilitating a Velvet Grading Guidelines panel with a view to the next season. The panel will be comprised of velvet buyers, velvet processors, DINZ and NZDFA representatives.

DFA branches were asked to nominate farmers to fill two positions on the panel in addition to Evan Potter from the NZDFA Executive Committee. Branches were also invited to provide their top five priorities for grading guidelines.

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A total of nine nominations were received covering most of the country (Southland up to Waikato). The Executive Committee have appointed Bruce Paterson (Southland) and Mark Tapley (SCNO) as the NZDFA representatives.

As noted, feedback from branches has been received but farmers should also feel free to contact any of the farmer reps to let them know of any concerns or suggestions.
